

The term has been very busy with a number of new work streams underway...

We have held one session with the Within School Leaders and where we split into two groups – primary and secondary. The primary school leaders shared the inquiries and the work streams that they have started in their schools. This was positive and displayed that we already have lots of great "gems" happening. Included in this is the maths hui work that James Smith from MIS has begun. The secondary WSL's got together to think about the Secondary Jumbo Day and how that they were going to collect information from their teachers.

Our second session with the WSL team occurred this week and we took them through some leadership and facilitation strategies, shared some readings from the OECD and continue to empower them to maximise strengths and gems in their own schools.

The secondary schools held a Jumbo Day and decided to have the focus on the Kāhui Ako. Brian Annan and Mary Wootton were the keynote speakers and then the ASL team and myself led a large amount of work around the strands of our achievement challenge.

At our last Kaitiaki group update meeting - we endorsed the Decision Making Protocols that we have developed with the support of Gabrielle Wall. This is a positive step forward and even though this does not directly affect student achievement it was essential that it is done for the continued success of the group as a whole.

The ASL team attended an Inquiry Seminar in Wellington with Infinity and this was very useful in sharing and learning from others on the same journey. It was really inspiring and exciting to hear what other Kähui Ako are doing around the country and how it's impacting on teachers, and then students. It is a shame that these opportunities are going.

The ASL team and I have developed an 18 month - 2 year Work plan for PLD for the K"ahui Ako. This is exciting and relates directly to our achievement challenge giving all staff opportunities to be part of cluster wide learning. This work plan also has the opportunity to be collaborative with the schools and centres to share the PLD that they are doing in their own schools and invite others in. We will launch this at the next update meeting on the 20h June.

The Kāhui Ako website is now live and will be updated at least once a term - this includes a bios of the ASL's and the WSL's and a link to the calendar which has meeting and PLD dates.

The Isemail Secondary school Jumbo Day took place on June 4th at 8t Matthew' collegiate. The secondary principals thought this would be a good opportunity to learn more about the Kahui Ako. The days started with our expert partner, Brian Annan from Infinity Learning, He spoke about how education was changing and the way Kahui Ako offered a chance to do things differently.

The Kalmui Ako is an opportunity for schools to work together to do things differently from our traditional isolated approach. <u>Birgham. Birwai-Couch's</u> moving speech was a starting point to get people making connection and reflecting on their practice. It was interesting to hear that we are experiencing many of the same challenges across quite different schools.

In the afternoon WSLs took the lead and looked at ways we could collaborate going forward and we will use these ideas to help us plan going forward. We are sure that everyone left with a better understanding of what the Kahui Ako is all about.



June WSLs Meeting:

The buzz was loud in the room as all of our Within School Lead teachers met for the bi-termly meeting. As always we all came away reenergised by the enthusiasm and ability in the room.

The Across School Leads and Janine briefly shared the two year PLD outline document and the newsletter that has been sent out to all Principals. We are pleased that the WSL Bio doc is almost complete.

2 activities were used as tools to keep facilitating collaboration and sharing - and also as take away tools to use in the WSL leadership roles in their schools. Many ideas were taken away by both ASL and WSL to use in our journey to meet the Achievement Challenge goals.

We are always impressed with the range of skills that our Kahui Ako Leaders have. Their within school projects are exciting and will benefit the whole Kahui Ako group.



Wellington Ready 4 Learning Foundation Skills Workshop

Thursday, 12 September 2019 from 08:30-14:30 at Silverstream School - Upper Hutt

How do you know when your learners are ready to access the curriculum?

What do you need to do so your learners can access the curriculum?

Learning readiness involves knowing a child's level of neurodevelopment and whether their sensory motor systems (vision, hearing, touch, smell, balance & sense of body in speec) are functioning well enough to support learning. Research has abown that if one or more of these areas are not fully developed, a child will find learning difficult and stressful, resulting in seemingly simple tasks causing tiredness, anxiety, distress and learned helplessness.

This workshop provides an understanding of the foundation skills that children need to have before successfully accessing the curriculum, how to gauge your learners skill level and what to do to support the development of these skills. This framework fits well in both a Learning through Play and more traditional classroom.
