I look forward to seeing you all at the meeting.



TERM 3 FAB COLLAB

Over the past few months, ākonga from York Street Kindergarten and Masterton Intermediate School have been engaging in shared learning experiences across both locations. As a great example of student led learning, tuakana/teina, and empowering ākonga; a small group of MIS students have been spending time at the kindergarten doing gardens with tamariki, reading, modelling social competence, fostering oral literacy, seeing first-hand the importance of the foundational years of learning and development, exploring and building on the interests of those under five, and more.

Meanwhile, tamariki from York Street Kindergarten have been enjoying weekly visits to the Intermediate school farm led by MIS students. Here, tamariki have been given an opportunity to further explore sustainability; how to care for our local environment, and ways we can look after animals such as sheep, pigs, and chickens. Kicking off Term Three, a group of ākonga from Masterton Intermediate School have already begun to spend time with those from York Street Kindergarten collaborating on ideas to revamp a space within the kindergarten. A space where ākonga from both settings can have their voice heard and their creativity flourish.

Also, the MIS students have been guiding tamariki in feeding Paddy (a visiting orphan lamb), and talking about what it takes to look after lambs in these cooler months. The kindergarten tamariki will also be taking on the role of being 'lamb monitors' this term, as the sheep on the neighbouring farm prepare for their offspring.

The team at York Street Kindergarten are looking forward to collaborating in more ways over the remainder of the year with some great ideas in the pipeline. They encourage others to think beyond their space and how they can connect with their local ECE's and schools through shared experiences. Those they've facilitated thus far have had great feedback from whānau who've dedicated some of their time to come along for outings and have seen the positive impact for their tamariki.









OTAUTAHI

Many of the Across Sector group were pleased to get down to Christchurch for a couple of days of meetings on the 28th and 29th of October.

Face to face discussions with the NZ Institute of Wellbeing and Resilience has put the Kahui Ako in an excellent position to make 2022 professional learning most relevant for all our kura. The Institute are very impressed with the way Whakaoriori Kahui Ako have used the 2021 PLD - constructed by the Institute but provided by CORE - education.

Friday saw the ASL team being shown around the University of Canterbury with a focus on their Wellbeing programmes and initiatives that have developed in the last few years. We spoke with key people from the wellness centre, student association, accommodation services and from their engagement team around the "ACE" Academic engagement programme which monitored all first year university students. While impressive, this has made us keen to see what other Universities are providing for their students, and also for our transition workstream to look further into how Whakaoriori can support our Year 13's in this transition to Tertiary. Members of our 'Success as Maori' team also met Janelle Riki-Waaka who until the end of the year works with CORE-Education. It is very exciting to have opportunities to work with her and her brother Nathan in 2022. This will benefit Kaiako, akonga and whānau all through Whakaoriori. Watch this space!

All in all, a very worthwhile short trip into Christchurch, where we are reminded that face to face meetings are so much more beneficial than virtual interactions.









PROGRESSIONS-UPDATE

The Transition form is being widely used across Whakaoriori and beyond, every school in the province has been sent their own username and login. We have held feedback and information sessions with stakeholders Principals, RTLB, LSCs, WSLs and SENCO staff. Please keep supporting this mahi in your kura. Next year we will introduce ECE transition form, Student and whānau voice forms. If Te Rito is pause for an extended time, then if may be possible to also design a pastoral information form, unique to our Kāhui Ako.

Some things to be aware of:

- The receiving school will know that the form you submit comes from your school.
- We have created a guest username and password that can be sent to schools outside the district. Please contact me if you require this information.
- Each school has been sent their own unique username and login this must be used to access the form. It is up to each kura to decide how to manage the process. I have copies of all usernames and logins if there is confusion or information has been misplaced. Please contact me if you are having user issues; evan.jones@trinityschools.nz

There have been a few modifications to the form resulting from feedback. We feel it is now fit for purpose and a final version. One useful addition is Save and Continue Later function. This may be used if student intentions aren't clear. This function generates a link that is emailed to you so you can access the form later to submit it.

There is an optional section for the author to add their (teacher) name in the event receiving school requires additional information

WSLs working in the progressions workstream have been working on localizing aspects of their school curriculum and developing graduate profiles. This is important work and is an ongoing project.

MOE Learning Progression Framework tools such as PaCT (Progress and Consistency Tool) provide valuable data that has sophisticated reporting functions that as a Kāhui we could use. It would be great if all Kura in Whakaoriori used this system for tracking student progress.

WHAT ARE OTHERS SAYING ABOUT OUR KĀHUI...

Whakaoriori (Masterton) Kāhui Ako

The Whakaoriori Kāhui Ako is one of the success stories in the Wellington region. The Kāhui embraced what it means to be a community of learning by including at the establishment stage ECE and Tertiary. The strength of the Kāhui Ako has been its leadership. Janine, quickly established a strong group of people to lead the Kāhui. She built the Across Leaders leadership capability and gave them licence to lead others including the Within School Leaders. She also worked with a small group made up of principals and ECE leaders to help her steer the Kāhui Ako. Janine's skill set empowers others, drives change and is strategic.

Another strength of the Kāhui Ako is how lines of communication have been developed.
